Santa Clara County's population increased 6% from 1.683 million in 2000 to 1.782 million in 2010. This rate of growth exceeded the Bay Area's growth rate of 5%, but was significantly less than the overall population growth of California (10%) and the United States (10%).



Santa Clara County's racial and ethnic composition changed significantly between 2000 and 2010. While the overall population increased 6%, racial and ethnic groups had a wide range of change. The Hispanic population increased 19%, the Asian population increased 32% and the White population decreased 16%. Currently, no one racial or ethnic classification is a majority within the county. Most significantly, Santa Clara County is within the top 1% of all U.S. counties in terms of racial and ethnic diversity.***





Santa Clara County's median age increased from 34 to 36 years between 2000 and 2010. Adults ages 45 and older increased to 36% of the county population, with the fastest growing age class being 85+ years. Children ages 0-19 remained relatively unchanged at 27% of the population, while the adult population, ages 20-44, contracted to 37%. However, when compared to the overall age composition of the United States, Santa Clara County is slightly younger on average.

Most of Santa Clara County's cities experienced growth from 2000 to 2010. San Jose, the county's largest city, grew by 51,000 residents, caused by a combination of net population growth, migration and annexations of unincorporated areas. The county's unincorporated population decreased 10%.
